



## EXP ADVISORY BOARD FAQs

### What is an advisory board?

An advisory board is a group of volunteers who collaborate with EXP staff and school faculty to create opportunities for students. Advisory boards meet on a quarterly base during the academic school year.

### What is the role of an advisory board member?

Advisory board members provide advice and support to enhance the classroom curriculum with their unique knowledge and skills, augmenting the pathway/academy they serve.

### Is there a financial commitment to be an advisory board member?

No. All we ask for is your time and talent.

### What qualifications are required to serve as an advisory board member?

- Commitment to EXP's mission: helping young people gain experience, unlock doors and build the confidence they need to succeed in school, career, and life.
- Strong industry knowledge and work experience within your field.
- Willingness to serve your communities as it relates to creating opportunities for students.

### What expectations do we have of our advisory board members?

- Attend a minimum of 3 advisory board meetings within the academic calendar, with dates to be determined by each committee.
- Assist in recruiting volunteers through your network to engage with EXP programs such as mock interviews, industry coaching, and guest speaking opportunities, as well as for our signature events such as GPS Your Future® and Women in STEM Career Day.

### What are the personal/professional benefits of participating in an advisory board?

In addition to positively impacting youth in your community and growing your local professional network, you will also be listed on our website and receive invitations to exclusive networking opportunities with EXP board members and other volunteers and supporters.

### How long is the term for an advisory board member?

Ideally, we are looking for a minimum one-year commitment for new members. However, the term varies for each pathway and school. Some advisory boards maintain the same chairperson and members for many years.
